


Dedication

In January, I was privileged to take the Oath of Office to begin my second term as your Governor. I am deeply humbled by the trust the people of Maine have placed in me, and I look forward to continuing to work hard over the next four years to improve the lives and livelihoods of Maine people.

Over the past four years, we have made real progress. We have expanded health care, leading to the largest decline in the uninsured rate of any state in the nation. I know that by working together to tackle these issues head-on, we can improve the lives and livelihoods of Maine people and make Maine the best place to live, work, and raise a family.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share an update on issues important to Maine and America.

One of my priorities for 2023 has been to improve the appropriations process in Congress – the way it decides how to spend taxpayer money. I took over as the Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee last year. Along with Chair Patty Murray, we decided the best change we could make was not to do something new. Instead, it was to do something old – that is, go back to the regular and transparent committee process that we used to have.

Part of restoring this process included holding 50 public Committee hearings, which allowed for input from senators on both sides of the aisle. As a result, for the first time in five years, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed all twelve of its funding bills on time. This was done with strong bipartisan support. In fact, seven of them passed unanimously.

Now, we need to work with the House of Representatives to pass these twelve bills and turn them into laws.

These bills contain funding for a wide range of Maine priorities, including support for the workforce at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, our lobster industry, infrastructure improvements, affordable housing, biomedical research, veterans, and heating assistance programs like LIHEAP. These bills also contain nearly \$590 million in Congressionally Directed Spending for 231 projects throughout the State of Maine. These projects would help promote job creation, expand access to health care, and improve public safety, infrastructure, and important resources in communities across all 16 counties of our state. I will continue to work to get these bills signed into law in the new year.

On October 25, the horrific mass shooting in Lewiston claimed the lives of 18 Mainers and injured 13 others. In response, I led Maine's Congressional Delegation in requesting an independent investigation by the U.S. Army Inspector General into the events leading up to the shooting. On December 15, the Under Secretary of the Army wrote to inform me that such an investigation will take place, and the Army Inspector General has instructed her team to immediately begin preparing to conduct this investigation. While nothing can undo the events of October 25, I will continue to work to understand what happened and what could have been done differently, and to find answers for the victims, survivors, and their families.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,855th consecutive roll call vote.

As we look ahead to 2024, I remain committed to addressing the concerns of Maine families and communities. If you need assistance or wish to share your thoughts, please do not hesitate to reach out to one of my six state offices.

We expanded access to affordable child care and increased salary stipends for child care workers, allowing parents to go to work with peace of mind. Dear Friends and Neighbors,

As the Second Regular Session of the Maine State Legislature convenes, I would like to thank you for granting me the opportunity to serve the citizens of District 4 in the Maine House of Representatives. Representing you is an honor and a privilege I take seriously. This is a wonderful opportunity for me to make a difference in the community and I am looking forward to the new challenges that wait in the 2024 legislative session.

The First Regular Session of the Legislature was a busy one, as lawmakers faced many difficult issues and decisions. I believe you will be pleased with some of the accomplishments of the 131st Legislature so far. My colleagues and I were able to pass multiple bi-partisan spending agreements that included supporting hospitals and long-term care facilities, working to stabilize highway and road funding, and improving the efficient delivery of government services. I continue to support legislation that would reduce high energy costs while shoring up supply resiliency and capacity, as well as procurement and generation priorities.

I proudly introduced LD 220, "An Act to Support Maine's Potato Farmers and Processors," which will be addressed in the upcoming session. This bill proposes to enact measures to support Maine's potato industry farmers and processors, including measures to respond to economic issues such as the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic and inflation.

I will continue to serve on the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry as we tackle matters that are crucial to our community. I encourage you to actively participate in your state government by monitoring all legislative proposals being worked on at the State House by visiting the Legislature's website at www.legislature.maine.gov. From here, you can browse bill summaries, view our legislative session and public hearing schedules, submit testimony, listen to committee hearings or watch live streaming video of the House and Senate.

Once again, thank you for the opportunity to represent you. Hearing your thoughts on the issues that are important to you helps me to better serve you. Town Manager's Report

Each year I sit down to write my letter for the Annual Report and every time I find myself reflecting on the work we've accomplished and the relationships we've strengthened with a sense of awe. I am amazed at all we have accomplished as a team! I am not only grateful to be writing about these positive changes, I am, as always, so thrilled to be a part of them.

To start, I have dedicated a great deal of time and effort to securing additional funding for our public safety building this year. Much of this time has been spent in trying to come up with creative ways to make this building look like it actually fits in the Town of Washburn and also trying to downsize the building into something that we can actually afford without affecting taxpayers wallets.

We successfully finalized the sand/salt shed project and that is now fully operational. It has proven to be a valuable venture and collaboration between the towns of Washburn and Wade. We are now focused on paving the rest of the roads. The roads that require the most attention at this point are the Caribou Lake Road, Tabor Road, the South Wade Road, and the remaining part of the Everett Road. With limited annual funding in the budget, we prioritize addressing the most critical areas first. We are very committed to improving these roads, even though the progress may seem gradual. Ultimately, once everything has been completed it will enable us to transition to a more sustainable maintenance plan, leading to a long term cost savings for both Washburn and Wade.

Thanks to an incredible, generous donation of \$5,000 we were able to make a very necessary improvement in the town. I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to the Penobscot McCrum family for their donation to our fire department in memory of Rudy Bell. Rudy was not only a long-time employee of the McCrum Family, but also an integral part of the Mars Hill Fire Department. This contribution played a significant role in offsetting the costs associated with the recent purchase of the ladder truck. As you see the truck out and about, you'll notice Rudy's picture and name proudly displayed on its side, serving as a tribute to his legacy. Additionally, I'm pleased to share that the Penobscot McCrum plant underwent expansion this past year, with operations commencing in January. This expansion will undoubtedly benefit our town as well.

We are getting ready for the installation of the new sidewalks. This has been a long time in the works and has turned into a much larger job than had been originally anticipated. Before that begins though, you'll notice the construction of a new parking lot between the library and Country Farms Market. This shared parking lot will provide access from both Main Street and Gould Street and should help alleviate parking issues once the new sidewalks are in place.

We recently entered into a joint venture with the Aroostook Agency on Aging. As a result of this collaboration, they have provided us with two, 55" large screen TV's, in addition to new tables & chairs. This equipment will be used to promote services offered by the Agency throughout the County, as well as allow the town to explore potential uses for different services that some of our departments may offer. Stay tuned for upcoming information on that.

Town Manager's Report (Con't)

We have upgraded all of our buildings with heat pumps, except for the Highway Garage and the Maintenance & Grounds building. Currently, I am in the process of applying for a Community Resiliency Grant to assist with the potential installation of heat pumps in both of the buildings. Speaking of the Highway Garage, the rubber roof on that building is in need of an upgrade this summer. You will see Power's Roofing on site taking care of this issue. The building is fairly old but the structure itself is still very strong and stable. We have made enhancements around the garage doors, installed a new entry door and the guys have made some excellent upgrades to the inside, not to mention how much they have done to the grounds all around the building. The only issue now is what to do with the old cement floor. If funds are available, we will try to tackle that this summer as well.

We are considering an upgrade to the little kitchenette area at the Rec Building. This is used on a weekly basis by the ladies from the Stitchin' N Givin' Group. Additionally, we are hopeful for improvements to the bathrooms as well. While we aimed to complete the bathroom upgrades this past year, securing a contractor is not the easiest task right now. They are all in high demand! The money that we had earmarked for that project last year has been set aside to use this year.

In the upcoming year we have a very exciting Eagle Scout project that will be starting at the Mill Pond Park. Keep your eye out for information about this! It's going to be another great project brought to our town thanks to Larry Harrison, his Boy Scouts, and The Washburn Rotary Club. Our town is incredibly fortunate to have the support of the Rotary Club and Boy Scout Troop 177 in our community!

This past year we successfully negotiated a deal with SBA, Inc. to buy out the lease on the cell tower. This proved to be a great deal for the town, as the sum of money that we received far surpassed what we would have received over twenty-five years of monthly payments. We are hopeful that these funds can be allocated to our Public Safety Building and/or possible additional paying projects.

Thank you again for your continued and endless support and dedication to our town throughout the past year. It has truly been another phenomenal year, filled with progress, growth, and moments of unity that have strengthened our bond as a community. As we look back on our accomplishments and look ahead to the remainder of the year, I am filled with optimism and excitement for what the future holds. Together, we will continue to build upon our successes, tackle challenges head-on, and work towards a strong and prosperous future.

Remember that my door is always open and there is no problem too large for us to tackle together. I look forward to seeing you, hearing from you, and working with you on a regular basis. Without all of you, my job would be meaningless.

Owners or keepers of dogs over six months old must procure a license annually before January 31st of each year. The tag issued with each license must be securely attached to a collar and worn at all times by the dog for which the license was issued. All dogs registered after January 31st are subject to a late fee of \$25.00, in addition to the license fee.

KENNEL LICENSES

When the number of dogs or wolf hybrids kept over 6 months of age does not exceed 10, the fee for licensure of the kennel is \$40.00 and, in addition, \$2.00 for each license as a fee for recording and making the monthly report required by the department.

They did a great job. We had 20 burials last summer.

PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Last year was another busy one and it definitely went by quickly. Throughout the year there were a variety of programs for adults and children.

During the winter there was basketball during the week for grades 1-4. This program lasted six weeks. The 3-4th grade group got to experience playing games against Easton. The 5-6th grade program consisted of a season full of games against other towns in the community. They also participated in the County Tournament in Caribou for the boys and in Presque Isle for the girls.

A new program that was offered was ski lessons at Quoggy Jo on Mondays for six weeks. I transported the children to the mountain and Quoggy Jo provided ski instructors.

Another program that was offered was the Hot Shot competition. Thank you to Mr. Shea for allowing me to use the physical education classes to hold the local competition. The top three girls and boys each age division competed in the State competition that was held at the Caribou Wellness Center.

During the spring time there was indoor soccer for children in grades 1-6. A new program that was offered was Adult Pickleball that was held on Wednesday evenings. There was also Lego club for children in grades 1-4 that was held downstairs in the Library.

During school vacations the children partake in a variety of field trips such as: roller skating at Melody Roller Rink in Caribou, ice skating at the Forum in Presque Isle, dodgeball at Presque Isle Rec. Center, mini golf and corn maze at Goughans Farm, snow tubing at Big Rock, bowling at Northern Lanes in Presque Isle, and movies at the Big Bang Theater in Caribou.

Our summer program staff consisted of Chelsea Hobbs, Jaici Rosi-Carney, Aidan Mulder, Maddie Johnston volunteered, and Kolbie Churchill drove a van for swim lessons and field trips. The programs that were offered were t-ball, minor league baseball, major league baseball, arts and crafts, cooking, basketball, soccer, track and field, pickleball, and swim lessons at the Mapleton pool. Every Friday during the six week program the children had the opportunity to attend field trips. The trips that were offered were: Hiking at Fish River Falls in Fort Kent, Mini Golf at Goughans Farm, Splash Pad in Presque Isle, Hike and Scavenger Hunt at Malcolm Science Center, Swimming at Portage Lake and Paradise Island in Grand Falls. I would like to thank Bruce Blakeney for the use of the church van to use for field trips and swim lessons.

During the fall there was soccer for children in grades 1-6. Grades 1-2 worked on developing their skills through a variety of drills and fun games. Grades 3-4 experienced playing against other communities such as Easton, Mars Hill and Ashland. The 5-6th grade straveling team participated in round robins each Saturday for six weeks and ended with the County Tournament that was held in Van Buren.

To celebrate the holiday season, there was holiday ornament making for children in grades 2-4 at the Rec. Center. Each child was able to make four ornaments to give to either a family member or a friend.

There is a very active senior citizen group in town. We meet once a month at the Rec. center to have lunch or breakfast. They also have had the opportunity to meet at the library to do a craft with Courtney Howe. In August, we have made it a tradition to invite Easton and Ashland Recreation Departments for a barbeque at Thomas Brewer Park.

Highway Department

The collaboration between the two highway departments has proven to be immensely beneficial for both towns. The past year was marked by significant productivity and accomplishments.

Together, the two towns made a joint investment in a used grader from Vaughn Nadeau. Given the shared need for regular grading of dirt roads in both towns, this purchase allowed us to handle the task internally rather than having to outsource it. It was a situation where neither Wade nor Washburn could have afforded a grader on their own, but together, it proved to be a win-win!

We rented an excavator from Carl Soderberg last summer for an entire month and a great deal of work was completed in both towns. Ditching was done on Caribou Lake Road and on the North Wade Road. Aside from that they also installed multiple culverts, used numerous tons of cold patch, and applied shim to sections of Caribou Lake and Tabor Road to provide temporary relief until paving can be scheduled.

Significant renovations were carried out at both Highway Garages. Washburn's garage received a facelift with the installation of new door panels, trimming for all doors, and a new entry door. Additionally, plans are in place for the installation of a much-needed rubber roof this summer, addressing a longstanding maintenance issue. Meanwhile, the Wade garage underwent substantial repairs, including the replacement of a rotted header above the garage door.

This past fall we realized that the Town of Washburn and the Town of Wade both had highway pickups that would no longer pass inspection. Together we purchased one pickup with a king cab that will haul all four of them if need be and we shared the cost of this. This newer, more reliable vehicle should last them a very long time. Neither of the towns could have purchased this pickup on their own, but by pooling our resources we were able to make it happen.

Additionally, another joint investment made by the two towns was the acquisition of a new steam cleaner. This equipment is used during the winter and spring to effectively clean out frozen culverts, benefiting both communities by ensuring proper drainage and preventing potential flooding issues.

With the upcoming summer season approaching quicker than we can blink, it is clear that it is going to be another busy and festive one. Every job we complete from now until then is another step toward enhancing the overall living conditions of our town. Together we continue to work tirelessly and consistently in order to make our little towns a better place for all the residents on a daily basis.



The Washburn Fire Department remains a leader in providing the highest level of fire service to citizens in the towns of Washburn, Wade, and Perham. The department has 17 volunteer firefighters, with over 70% trained at the Firefighter I or Firefighter II certification. Washburn operates six pieces of fire suppression apparatus including one ladder truck, one rescue truck equipped with the Jaws of Life; two brush trucks for wildland fire suppression: and, with the collaboration of the Washburn Snowmobile Club, the snowmobile

and rescue toboggan - making our well-maintained trails safer for all



To the residents of Washburn

Washburn remains extremely busy and continues to grow as more businesses come into town. However, as everyone is aware the drug issue has become almost out of control. Washburn has seen an increase in drug activity and Domestic Violence and Thefts. This is not only in Washburn but everywhere in Aroostook County also has seen this increase. This year we had a total of 3560 complaints which is higher than last year's number of 3228 complaints. We continue to try to enforce the laws with mostly warning for minor traffic offenses and have had several arrests for more severe offences. My goal for all the Officers was to try to do rural Policing and get to the know the community you live in. As most of you know Covid caused a riff in society that changed what the norm looks like. We were challenged to find Police Officer to fill the positions in town. The officers worked shorthanded and ended up working a lot of hours on call. Police hourly rates ended up having to be increased to continue to keep employees from going to other larger communities that were able to pay a much higher hourly rate. This had a large effect on keeping officers and attracting new personnel to Washburn. As most of you know I was hired to temporarily help in getting the Washburn Police through a rough time when the Chief at the time resigned. I had told myself that it would be short-term. Well four years later I knew I could not keep doing the job. I realized it was too much for me to handle. I also am the Chief of Police for the Town of Ashland and serve as Ashland's Town Manger as well. My goal was to finish at the end of January 2024 and the search has begun for a new full-time Chief. I have enjoyed working with Town Manager Donna Turner and Washburn Council. I would like to thank both for all their support. I wish everyone well and feel free to contact me at the Ashland Town Office if you have any concerns.

AT 1:00 O'CLOCK IN THE AFTERNOON (Eastern Standard Time), then and there to act on Articles 1 and 2.

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To select all Town Officials as required to be elected by secret ballots; namely, two (2) members to serve on the Washburn Town Council for three-year terms, two (2) members for three-year terms to serve on the Board of Directors for Maine School Administrative District #45.

Should any particular grant require matching funds from the Town of more than \$10,000.00, then a Special Town Meeting will be held to obtain permission regarding that grant application and expenditures.

To see if the Town will vote to require the municipal officers to provide the former owner(s) of tax-acquired property, or if deceased his/her/their heirs/devisees/personal representative 30 days to repurchase the property for a price equal to all outstanding taxes, interest, fees and costs; if the former owner does not repurchase the property the municipal officers may sell the property through the sale process in 36 MRS § 953-C, provided that if the former owner does not timely request that process or the board is unable to list or sell the property as required by § 943-C(3), the board may sell the property through a competitive sealed bid process in which a notice advertising sale of the property shall be published at least twice in a newspaper of general circulation in the county. For sales to someone other than the former owner(s), excess sale proceeds as defined in 36 MRS § 943-C, shall be returned to the former owner.
- **ARTICLE 24.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Council, on behalf of the Town, to sell, lease, and/or dispose of any Town-owned property, at such price and under such terms and conditions as the Town Council deems advisable, and to negotiate and execute any and all documents necessary to accomplish any such transaction.
- **ARTICLE 25.** To see if the Town will authorize and instruct the Town Council to apply and charge all overdrafts in the Town Officers Report for the fiscal year ending on or before January 31, 2025, which overdrafts are not to exceed 7.5% of the original department Appropriation total without approval of a Special Town Meeting.
- **ARTICLE 26.** To see if the Town will fix a date when taxes shall be due and payable and set a rate of interest to be charged on taxes unpaid after said date. Tax bills shall be due and payable upon presentation with a **2%** discount for payment within 30 days, and interest shall be assessed at the rate of **8.5%** as of November 1, 2024, until paid. Advance payment of estimated taxes shall be accepted before commitment, and no interest shall be paid for unsolicited advance payment or overpayment of estimated taxes.
- ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the tax collector to enter into a standard agreement with taxpayers establishing a tax club payment plan for property taxes, whereby: (1) the taxpayer agrees to pay eleven (11) specified monthly payments to the Town based on his/her actual tax obligation for current year property taxes; (2) the Town agrees not to charge interest on timely payments made pursuant to the tax club agreement; (3) the Town authorizes the tax collector to accept tax club payments for current year taxes which may be made prior to the tax club payment due date; (4) the tax club agreement is automatically terminated if a monthly payment is not made, and the taxpayer then becomes subject to the same

due date(s) and interest date(s) and rate as other taxpayers who are not participating in the tax club; (5) only taxpayers who do not have outstanding tax obligations for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program; and (6) taxpayers wishing to participate in the tax club for a particular property in the current tax year shall enter an agreement with the Town by a deadline determined by the tax collector as noted on the current tax bill.

ARTICLE 28. (Under Estimated Income) To see if the Town will vote to accept money from the Maine Department of Transportation for Local Roads Assistance Funds in the estimated amount of \$34,000.00 for the purpose of road maintenance and repairs.

ARTICLE 29. (Under Estimated Income) To see if the Town will vote to accept funds from the State of Maine provided by the Maine State Legislature the following funds (excluding Local Roads Assistance contained in the previous article) are:

- 1. State Municipal Revenue Sharing
- 2. General Assistance Reimbursement
- 3. Veterans Exemption
- 4. Tree Growth
- 5. Homestead Exemption
- 6. BETE Reimbursement

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Officers to spend an amount equal to 2/12ths of the 2024 budget from February 1, 2025, through March 31, 2025. This will allow the Town to operate during the two (2) months prior to the Annual Town Meeting.
